Resource options available through national programs:

- Anonymous and open donations
- Donor designated placement options and stipulations (geographic, religious, marital)
- Involvement in choosing the recipient couple (if desired)
- Donor and Recipient Counseling
- Reimbursement for cryopreservation and storage fees

Consider outside resources for embryo donation and adoption if:

- Time, resources or staff are too limited to add new services
- Complexities and liabilities of legal, social and medical/FDA requirements are prohibitive
- You have too few donated embryos to offer a reasonable choice to potential recipients
- You desire assistance in patient counseling, preventing embryo abandonment, and managing embryo storage problems or nonpayment of storage fees.
